*Gold Star Family - This title, which is reserved for families of military members who have died in the line of duty, is meant to honor the service members' ultimate sacrifice. The gold star stands for a sacrifice made for honor and freedom; acknowledging their family's loss, grief, and continued healing.

*Blue Star Families consists of the immediate family member of a service member during a time of conflict. The Blue Star symbolizes hope and pride.

*Silver Star Families are those with a loved one wounded in action and the flags first became part of military family tradition during World War 1. Since then, the banners can be seen in front windows of military households across the country.

*White Star Families had a family member who served in the military and lost their life to suicide. This service banner has yet to be approved by the Secretary of Defense.

We need to honor and recognize these families. We need to educate the public what these stars mean. Please share your ideas with me and our Americanism chairman, Vickie.

Many of us that have been around the Auxiliary since the beginning of time may remember a program that was known as Community Service. This program allowed members to count our service hours with other organizations within the Auxiliary. Then the program was done away with and we were left wondering how to count those hours or if we could.

It seems that over the years, National has been listening and this year decided to bring back this program. It has been renamed as “**VFW Auxiliary Community Outreach Program**”. This program focuses on the non-core programs/projects an Auxiliary or member chooses to participate in and those projects/hours can be counted in this program.

This program is for projects that do not fall under other Auxiliary programs. The projects must be approved by the Auxiliary and recorded in the meeting minutes prior to the project. This does not mean that the Auxiliary has to come up with the idea. Perhaps the Auxiliary wants to give back to the community and decides to Adopt a Highway/Street in their town. It would get brought up and voted on in the meeting. Steps to make this happen with the city would be taken and those hours each month would be counted under this program. Or maybe members work with other Civic groups and would like those hours counted- just bring it up at the meeting and get approval.

When out volunteering in the community, be sure to wear Auxiliary attire. This is a great way to start conversations with others about what we do and who we are. Think about conversations happening about our scholarships, legislative initiatives, Buddy Poppies or membership. The positive impact of our members volunteering in the community and being visible is a huge PR for our organization.

BUDDY POPPIES – Education is important!!

Make sure to educate the community, veterans, their families and children that Poppies remind us of the blood our soldiers gave for their freedom and what it does for Veterans and families now.

Poppies are a reminder that veterans in VA hospitals and domiciliary and in state veterans' homes, every day would be VFW "Buddy"® Poppy Day. These men and women assemble the Poppies, tie them in bunches of 10 and pack them in boxes of 500, 1,000 or 2,000 for shipment to the Posts and Auxiliaries. VFW pays the disabled veteran for the work. In most cases, this extra money provides additional income for the worker to pay for the little luxuries which make life more tolerable. Furthermore, Poppy assembly is often used as a therapy program to provide exercise for fingers and hands crippled by wounds, disease, and the effects of old age.

Make a "Wall of Remembrance" at your Post. Patrons can request a Poppy in honor of a loved one who has died. Their name gets placed on the wall with a Poppy hanging next to it. Honorees' names can be typed on note cards with the Poppies stapled to them.

Use Poppies to make table centerpieces that can be raffled off at Post suppers. Poppies also are important because all proceeds from distribution are used for veteran's welfare or for the well-being of dependents and the children of veterans. More than 2,300 children of veterans have been or are being cared for in the VFW National Home in Eaton Rapids, Michigan, thanks to a portion of Poppy funds.

Please make sure to purchase your poppies and use them throughout the year. Start planning your poppy display now.

Why should we all be a registered voters in Arizona?

No matter who is making the White House their home, today or any day, each of us must raise our voices through the Legislative process to assist and protect our veterans, active military, and their families.

By banding together and working with our VFW Washington D.C. office, we are able to use the strength our member numbers to lobby for the rights and benefits that are needed.

For the Presidential election, the United States uses the Electoral College system. This means that each state gets a certain number of electors based on its total number of representatives in Congress. Each elector casts one electoral vote following the general election; there are a total of 538 electoral votes. The candidate that gets more than half (270) wins the election.

This system has been widely debated over many years with no changes in the foreseeable future.

Arizona will award all 11 (one for each Arizona Senator and District Representative) of their presidential electors to the presidential candidate who wins a plurality of the popular vote in the state. Each one of these electors will cast one vote for a Presidential Candidate to determine the next President of the United States.

The President is not elected by the majority of individual votes...the President is elected by the electors, who are chosen by the majority of individual votes... so EVERY VOTE MATTERS in determining our next President.

While voting in a Presidential year gets a lot of attention, the opportunity to affect our way of life through legislation, happens on an ongoing basis. As a registered voter, your voice matters in the election of every elected official from your local city governments thru your state representatives in Congress. We have a responsibility to elect those candidates that will best represent our primary goals for our veterans and our Mission.



Mentoring For Leadership Chrissy Harlan

Every member should have at least one person they can go to for help and guidance. This person must be Reliable, Outgoing, a Consistent Communicator, and Knowledgeable. In one word a **ROCK**.

Being **Reliable** is being where we say we will be and doing what we said we will do. Members count on us to live up to our word. Often, we mentor by example; if we are not Reliable then other members think that they do not need to be either.

A good mentor is **Outgoing** even though much mentoring goes on behind the scenes. You do not need to be the life of the party to be a good mentor but you must be enthusiastic about the work of our organization and let it show to others.

Being a **Consistent Communicator** is essential in mentoring. Remember that communication has two sides: Speaking and Listening. Listening to members questions and concerns and offering answers and solutions are a huge part of mentoring. Talk to the Mentee on their level not in language that is above their experience or talking down to them. Being consistent about not getting caught up in canteen gossip by listening to it or spreading it is of the utmost importance.

Being **Knowledgeable** does not mean that as a mentor you have to know

everything because none of us does. It does mean that if you do not know the answer that you will be honest about it and then find the answer by contacting one of your **ROCKs**.

New members, members that have been inactive for a while, and new officers all need mentoring but everyone of us needs mentoring on something from time to time.

Some mentoring is formal but sometimes it is informal and we don't even realize that we are doing it. Mentoring takes place everywhere and all the time. Some great opportunities for formal mentoring are at Auxiliary meetings, District meeting, Department events, and special mentoring sessions.

There are Department and National Awards for Mentoring for Leadership for both members and auxiliaries.

The Outstanding New Mentor Award is for members. Auxiliaries will be awarded for the most outstanding use of a Mentoring for Leadership activity during an Auxiliary meeting. Nominations and entries must be submitted to me by March 31, 2021.

A Mentoring for Leadership activity during an Auxiliary meeting must be completed and a Project Report sent to me in order to qualify for the Department Circle of Excellence.

How better to Honor our Mission of Serving Veterans than to ask youth to explore Patriotic topics? This year's themes for Voice of Democracy and Patriot's Pen will be exceptionally interesting to learn about the current events through their eyes.

Voice of Democracy- open to students in grades 9, 10, 11 and 12 with the theme, "Is this the Country the Founders Envisioned?" is a recorded, oral essay, 3 to 5 minutes in length.

Patriot's Pen-a written 300 to 400 word essay, for students in grades 6, 7 and 8 with the theme, "What is Patriotism to Me?"

Both Voice of Democracy and Patriot's Pen entries are due to the local VFW by October 31, 2020.

Education is going to be new and challenging at all levels in the upcoming year. As an Auxiliary, we might not have had the availability to start the scholarships campaign or fundraising with usual events or timeline. Students still deserve the opportunity to share their point of view on the presented topics. They might need a little additional encouragement letting them know their voice and opinion on Patriotism is especially important in this ever-changing world. Be patient with schools, instructors and students who will be working to get back on track after being out of the classroom setting for an

extended absence.
