NDCM #15 Chrissy Harlan

The 2024 VFW Auxiliary National Convention is in the Record Books now. It was great meeting up with old friends and making new ones.

Congratulations to Bambi Johnson and Beth Miller and both Departments for joining the Circle of Excellence. Both Departments worked hard to achieve this award.



During the Convention 15 Resolutions were presented to the members to vote on Bylaw changes. I will only go through a few of them here but if you have questions on the others, they should be on Malta under Member Resources soon. You can also always contact your Department Presidents or myself if you have questions.

The resolution to expand our membership eligibility criteria failed. Had it passed it would not have been approved by the VFW due to our Charter regulations. We were told that the VFW is working on ways to expand our eligibility so hopefully by this time next year we may have other options. The VFW did approve a Resolution to make Purple Heart Medal recipients eligible regardless of any other service medals.

The Resolution to allow District Dues up to 75 cents was amended to \$1 and passed; the Resolution regarding electing National Council Members was tabled in order to find better wording; and the Resolution concerning Treasurer's Reports in a 3 Ring Binder passed. The most contentious Resolution was regarding deleting the requirement to profess a belief in God. After much emotional discussion the vote was almost 50/50 with 1306 votes in favor of removing the language and 1377 against. For whatever reason there were 91 abstention votes.

During the National Council of Administration Meeting, I asked several questions regarding the 2023-2024 Budget. My main concern was with the overages in travel for the National President and her Documentarian. Having

spoken to the Arizona and New Mexico Delegates, we agreed these overages were a large issue. I spoke on the Council floor about member perception and accountability. I asked the Council to vote against approving these overages but the motion to approve them still passed. I did what I could and hopefully it put the National Organization on notice that we are paying attention and that they may not get away with overages again.

At the 2023 Convention Council Meeting at MID Year, I moved to have all the National Council of Administration Documents, with the exception of Disciplinary Actions, on Malta for ALL members to review and the motion passed. Members of both Departments were telling me that they were not on their Malta pages, so I asked why they were not up. I was told by the National Secretary that the Approved Budget is under Member Resources. It was the intent of the motion that the proposed budget and Minutes be there as well, so we need to present a new and precisely worded motion at the Mid-Year Conference in 2025.

Thank you to all the members from New Mexico and Arizona that were at the National Convention and talked with me. My love to you all and I look forward to seeing you again soon.

So primary voting is complete, still waiting on all results, and then moving on to General election. You can check this out on your county website or the Secretary of State website.



Voter registration deadlines:

- In Person: 29 days before Election Day, or on the next immediate business day if the deadline falls on a legal holiday or weekend.
- By Mail: Postmarked 29 days before Election Day and received by 7 p.m. on Election Day.
- Online: 29 days before Election Day, or on the next immediate business day if the deadline falls on a legal holiday or weekend.

As of June 30, 2024 there were 11 statewide ballot measures on this coming general election, this does not include your local areas, so it is important you pay attention to your voter information booklet that comes out 30 days before each election.

You'll be hearing a lot about interacting with your representatives as well as signing up for Action Corps weekly. All VFW programs relate to the Priority Goals:

- 1. Budget
- 2. Health Care
- 3. Disability Assistance and Memorial Affairs
- 4. Education, Employment and Transition Assistance
- 5. Military Quality of Life
- 6. National Security, Foreign Affairs and POW/MIA, (Prisoner of War and Miassing in Action)

The VFW actively lobbies Congress and the administration on behalf of veterans. Monitor all bills, testifying at committee hearings and interacting with members from your local representatives to your congressional representatives.

Example of how bills affect our veterans is SB1172-21. This was almost lost because our Governor recommended these appropriated monies for a VA Home in Mohave Country be returned to the general fund. This would fall under Veteran, Family Services, assistance. Had our members not helped in contacting their representatives this may have been lost but because many contacted their representatives on the state level, it was extended to 2028 in restricted funds. So now getting the VA Administration to decide on which donated property, we need to advocate with them to get a choice made, i.e. the signatures that the VFW and Auxiliary supports this endeavor. One person is a whisper, a thousand or more is a roar.

Your priority Goals can be found in MALTA under resources, programs, legislature or on www.vfwauxaz.org under programs, legislature. You can also find other good information to help you when planning your event or collaborating with your VFW Post connecting members with local lawmakers.

Again, the election process is a way for you as a veteran or family member to have a say in who is elected to office that would best support our veterans. Connect with candidates and elected' and let them know our goals and follow the progress of a bill through the stages of the process by going to www.congress.gov.

Want to speak at a hearing or your state level, go to https://www.azleg.gov/group/request-to-speak/#:~:text=You%20can%20create%20an%20account,wishing%20to%20testify%20in%20committees.

Please remember to go to any local events where you can meet, talk and ask questions of your candidates, now and in the future. If you're at an event and an elected official or candidate is mentioned, seek them out, give them your name and hand them our Priority goals.

Please check out the do's and don'ts of Advocating and if you have a candidate at your Post or sponsored event, make sure that it is not an endorsement of any candidate and if you campaign for a candidate, do not wear Auxiliary attire when campaigning.

From National it is a Scholarship:

This one is open any Auxiliary members who has been a member for at least one year, or their spouse or their children with a financial need. There is only one winner in each of the **4 conferences**.

The application is sent directly to National VFW Auxiliary in Kansas City and is due to them by the 15th of February. Last year's winner of our Western Conference came from Tucson AZ. So, let's have AZ win again this year. The awarded amount is \$1,250.00. Get the information out to all of our Auxiliary members. Let's show National that we can do it again.

From The Department of Arizona, it is a Grant:

One **Educational Grant** of \$1,000 will be awarded to the first-place winner. The Department of Arizona Auxiliary is pleased to present a \$1,000 grant to assist members who wish to further their education by pursuing a college degree or a career direction at a vocational or technical school. Applicant must be a current member of an Arizona VFW Auxiliary AND must be 18 years of age or older. This is not for their spouse or children unless they are also members of the Auxiliary. This is a good membership tool as maybe the kids do not realize they can become members at the age of 16. Talk to the colleges, Foundation Coordinators, and see if any of the students might be able to join the Auxiliary under their grandparents or parents or even their brothers or sisters. This one is due to me by the 30th of April.

The **Arizona Merit Scholarship** is for 12th grade students only. A child or grandchild of an auxiliary member or if they can be a member themselves. They must fill out a binder with sheet protectors and sent to me by the 30th of April with the following information:

Transcripts from 9-12 grades

Letters of recommendations from teachers, friends, family, pastors, employers, camp counselors or anyone that may know their qualities.

Any work records or volunteer records.

Any awards they have received for past ventures.

Copy of their College, vocational, or trade school application and acceptance letter.

These 3 awards get so little attention as we all work hard on the Voice of Democracy and Patriots Pen to assist the VFW and the 2 different Young American Creative Arts contests, let's not forget these other contests.

What is one way to Support Veterans and their families? Supporting the VFW Service officer Program. You can donate directly on line at <u>VSO Donation</u>, Districts and/or Auxiliaries that wish to donate will need to Contact the Department Quartermaster for instructions.

Did you know that the VFW has close to 1900 accredited Veteran Service Officers (VSOs). An accredited VSOs are trained experts that help

veterans, and their families navigate benefits, including assisting in applying for benefits that are available. Benefits may include, disability compensation, education programs, death benefits, training programs and more. The use of a VSO is FREE of Charge to any Veteran and/or their family member.

Not only Does AZ have a Department Service Officer, but each post has what is known as a Post Service Officer (PSO), PSOs help veterans and families gather all needed documents and information that a VSO may need in helping to complete a claim or apply for benefits.

Our Website, VFWAUXAZ.ORG, contains the Google form to be used for your regular reporting. This is the only form being used this year! You can find the form behind log in/program activity report. This is also where you can find the tracking sheet each month. Please take the time to look at the tracking

sheet to make sure you Auxiliary's PARs are being recorded.

Please remember that in order to be considered for the Outstanding Auxiliary Award, your Auxiliary must turn in 12 PAR reports.

We have made your reporting so very simple; it can be done in a matter of minutes! It is a new year and Program Activity Reports (PARs) are so very important!

This is the monthly or quarterly report every Auxiliary sends to provide numbers to the Department of Arizona, then, National, starting every year in April. Why are these numbers so important?

All these numbers are important because they demonstrate our Mission to support our Veterans and their families through our Programs. Every Donation, act of charity, Fund Raiser, Patriotic Festivity, etc., is what we need so desperately to hear about. When we compile all these numbers, they affect our ability to represent our Veterans and their families in the legislature to get and keep what is owed to them in Benefits, Support and Understanding.

Here are some examples that should be reported on your regular PAR:

- Providing Flag Education, Patriotism, POW/MIA and Star Family Recognition
- Supporting local Community Groups (hours and number of members)
- Poppy Distribution and Displays and National Home Education and Fund Raising
- Regular Newsletters or Emails to your Members as well as Mentoring Projects
- Members who regularly assist Veterans and/or their families with rides to the doctor, grocery shopping, well care visits, etc.
- Hospital work or donations, including Honors Escort Education
- Membership recruitment, retention, and appreciation
- Special Recognition Events
- Assisting the VFW with Voice of Democracy and Patriot Pen Scholarships
- Donations and Fund Raisers for Scholarships (all)
- Any assistance or donations for Veterans and their families
- Books donated for Youth and support provided for "Get Excited for the Red, White and Blue" and Illustrating American Contests for Youth

This is not a complete listing of things to report, just a short listing to keep us from forgetting to report EVERYTHING!
