



VFW & VFW AUXILIARY NATIONAL CONVENTION APP

The VFW and Auxiliary are sharing a National Convention App again this year. In it, the VFW and Auxiliary have organization-specific content for attendees. Download this free app, called VFW Events, in the Apple and Google Play stores to see BOTH organizations' schedules, create your own personal Convention schedule, find meeting locations, chat with other members and more. The VFW's agenda items are color-coded red, while ours are blue.

IMPORTANT:

- When you register in the app as an attendee, you must choose an affiliation (enter VFW or AUX) in order to receive announcements/ push notifications.
- Comcast email addresses are not compatible with the app software.
- Upon creation of your profile, the app will ask for your preferred time zone. Be sure to select "Detected Device Time Zone." This will ensure that your app time zone is updated upon arrival and all agenda items have the accurate time.
- If you're unable to access the VFW Events app for any reason, you can still access the web version of the app at eventmobi.com/ VFWConvention2024.

Advocating for fellow veterans is what drives Richard (Tony) Marshall, who served in the U.S. Marine Corps during the Vietnam War.

Now an accredited
veterans service officer (VSO)
with the Department of Veterans
Affairs in Nevada, Marshall's journey to

his current role began with a tough reentry to civilian life after serving overseas. Getting the help he needed was a struggle, which influenced him to make his life's work about stepping in on other soldiers' behalf.

Marshall joined the Marine Corps after graduating from high school. He originally wanted to go to college, but his family's financial situation didn't allow him to do so.

After boot camp and infantry training, he was deployed to Vietnam, where he would be injured during a truck explosion and sent home. After six months of recovering and being on limited duty, he was discharged.

Like many soldiers, Richard did not receive a warm welcome home after his time in Vietnam and suffered from undiagnosed Post Traumatic Stress (Disorder) or PTS(D).

"Three marriages, three colleges and I worked many jobs over the next 29 years; I was a walking mess," Marshall said. "Self-medicating with daily drugs and alcohol. During one of my usual episodes, I was approached by an (accredited) service officer from Boise, Idaho Post 63 and asked to be evaluated for PTS(D)."

Marshall agreed and six months later was in treatment. His experience with the service officer changed his outlook on life, leading him to become a VFW Life Member and, later, a service officer himself.

"In 2003, I began working with other service officers to learn how to file the forms and to ask the appropriate questions," Marshall added. "I was determined to prevent any veteran that I could from going through what I had gone through. In 2005, I became a Post service officer for the VFW and the American Legion."

"Richard is totally inspired and involved with his comrades, their families and friends," wife Saundra Marshall, Life Member of Auxiliary 12198, said. "He is surrounded by many family members who have served faithfully. Richard listens and voices his direct opinion."

In 2023, Marshall became an accredited service officer assisting veterans with their VA claims and benefits while being an advocate.

"Veterans, old and young, are left without knowing what's available or even what questions to ask," he said. "To be able to provide 'the answers' to the unasked questions and move a veteran in the right direction is my reward. To see the positive change in a veteran's future with self and family is worth it all."

Outside of being a VSO, Richard assists bereaved out-ofstate family members to finalize their deceased veterans' affairs, helps Post and Auxiliary members relocate into a new facility and conducts a monthly Veteran's Informational Seminar at the North Las Vegas Resource Center.

"We have a large population of military, active and retired, and veterans. The seminar is one way for me to reach out and a chance to bring the community together," Marshall said. "The monthly seminar is an overview of benefits, state and national, and a general insight into the claims process. This provides those veterans, family members or anyone interested in veterans an opportunity to learn from an accredited service officer the correct answers, to sometimes very misled assumptions. \subsection SM

With two years of medical school under her belt and more to go, Brown is dreaming about the day she receives her medical degree and starts her journey.

"One day, I will graduate with a medical degree in hand and two letters added to my signature, but what I will cherish most is the honor and privilege of serving others in their time of need. I view each day as an opportunity to build upon my foundational knowledge to ensure my future patients and their families feel secure in placing confidence in me. I want to stand before them fully prepared to care for their health and wellness with security and empathy, because that is the true duty of a physician," Brown said.



During the pandemic, Daniel Joseph Gately began his career as a teacher... virtually. Upon the return of students to in-person learning, Gately, the son of Auxiliary 549 Life Member Kathryn Gately, was able to complete his first official year in the classroom, which is when he made the choice of bettering himself for the students he teaches. He is now pursuing a master's degree in education with a focus on gifted education and educating multilingual learners.

"My commitment to having a career in education has been unwavering despite the everincreasing struggles that students and educators face in the workforce...," he said. "In my daily work schedule, I see almost 120 students ranging from gifted to advanced, to multilingual and even those with learning disabilities. I feel that the choices I have made professionally are sound but I can also reflect on my life and realize that I need to further expand my understanding of my students, their needs and their paths to success."



When Emily Grace Laurie was in high school, she spent every Friday lunch period as a volunteer working on communication and social skills with the students in special education. Little did she know that she would later start pursuing a master's degree in Speech-Language Pathology at the University of Mary. Laurie is the daughter of Auxiliary 1652 Member Tamela Laurie.

"Through this experience, I have been exposed to all that a speech-language pathologist can do and who we might work alongside," Laurie said. "I am so thankful for the opportunities that I have received through my education. With the help of this scholarship, I will be able to achieve my goal by getting through school with less debt allowing me to focus on becoming the best speech-language pathologist I can."

SPECIAL JOINT PROJECT WILL BENEFIT VFW NATIONAL **HOME RESIDENTS**





VFW and Auxiliary members gifted nearly \$125,000* for the combined special project of VFW Auxiliary National President Carla Martinez and VFW Commander-in-Chief Duane Sarmiento this Program Year. Funds will bring more on-site resources to the families on campus by converting the administration lobby into a Welcome Center.

"Because we are miles from town, there is little support when it comes to basic food and beverage needs," said VFW National Home Executive Director Mike Wilson. "The retail space in the Welcome Center will be a space where residents can get simple things like bread, milk and microwavable dinner choices that are conducive to feeding a family on a limited budget and time constraint. In the meantime, our clothing and souvenir space in the Welcome Center will be more convenient for our visitors and guests."

Additionally, he said, "The Welcome Center project will change the face of the administration space by providing a warm and welcoming environment for our visitors and residents as well as insuring postal and parcel mail gets to the residents in a timely manner. With so many people ordering online these days, no one should have to wait for a package because we are closed for the evening or the weekend."

For nearly 100 years, the National Home has helped military and veteran families who need a fresh start. Families can live there rent-free for up to four years and have access to professional case management services, on-site licensed child care, life skills training, tutoring and other educational services as well as recreational and community service opportunities. Families find healing in a safe and peaceful environment of tree-lined streets, 42 single-family homes, facilities such as a gym, library, computer and science labs, day care center, playgrounds, fishing pond, hiking trails and more.

"We are truly thankful to Duane and Carla for taking on this project fundraiser and all those who donated to it," Wilson said.

He had described the renovation as "a game changer in how we support the families within our community. This project is part of our mission to provide a positive, safe, and healthy environment for our residents to achieve their personal and family goals."

The Home hopes to complete the project by late fall.



Remembering JANICE CRISWELL

Janice Criswell was an esteemed mentor to countless members during her 22 years on staff at National Headquarters. Her wealth of VFW Auxiliary knowledge was nothing short of remarkable; she could cite articles and sections of the *National Bylaws* from memory. She empowered members to succeed with candor and kindness.

The news of her unexpected passing in May elicited hundreds of stories and kind statements shared on the National Facebook page, as well messages of surprise and

sadness. Fellow members, who were family

to her, and former students, described Criswell as a legendary woman,

irreplaceable...she touched many lives. She was a lifeline. She always had answers. And you always knew where you stood with her. And now, as one member stated, she "has her wings."

Criswell, Director of
Administrative Services,
passed away peacefully in
her sleep on May 22, 2024.
She is survived by her brother,
Robert, a niece and nephew, three
great-nephews and one
great-niece.

She was a 45+ year member who served the Auxiliary in a number of capacities, including as the longtime Secretary of the Department of Kansas. She was also a Past Department of Kansas President and had served as Western Conference Membership Chairman and VFW-PAC Chairman, National Safety Director and National Chief of Staff under PNP Evelyn McCune. She joined Auxiliary 2864 under the eligibility of her father, a World War II veteran, because she wanted to belong to "the strongest women's group that supports veterans and young people."

During her more than two decades with National Headquarters, she was a familiar sight at National Conventions, seated on stage with pen and paper, always ready with information about the Bylaws and Auxiliary precedent. She also co-hosted HQ Roundtable, National Headquarters' Facebook Live show, several times per year, during which she would answer questions from the membership, give sound advice and banter good-naturedly with National Secretary-Treasurer Ann Panteleakos.

Panteleakos described her as dedicated,

hardworking and caring, saying, "Janice

had a great memory. She was always the first to offer a hand when

someone needed it. She truly

cared about the organization and all the members she helped. I knew people loved her, but I didn't realize just how many people she touched until she passed."

She truly did help many, and will be fondly remembered for it.

Jeanette Cox first met Criswell in the 1990s. Cox recalls a thoroughly inspiring and encouraging

woman and the once-in-a-lifetime closeness

they forged over the years.

"Anyone that every dealt with Janice knows that she was more than willing to help you if you were willing to take the steps to learn. I've held many positions in the organization which I never would have dreamed of if it hadn't been for her continued guidance. The biggest thing about Janice was her compassion for the organization, and if you were her friend, she would do anything for you. There will never be another 'Janice' in my life. She was my rock and my friend, but most of all, she was as much a sister to

me as my own sisters. I loved her and will miss her more than she would even realize."

"Janice was one of my favorite people and a great mentor," said Department of Oregon Secretary Valorie Wrinkle. "I know people all over the country are going to mourn her loss. She had such an impact on all of us and was such a great resource. I had huge respect for her, but also I just liked her a lot as a person."

Jane Thibault Barton described Criswell as "A dear friend, mentor and my sounding board. I'll always treasure her friendship, sense of humor and support."

"She was one of a kind," said Leona McDermott, Past Department of Florida Secretary. "She will be sorely missed."



Criswell's talents included photography, computer skills and a mastery of the English language, which made her a solid editor and an asset in the many roles she served. For more than 25 years before joining the staff of National Headquarters, Criswell was a grade 7-12 Language Arts teacher. In 2023, the Wheatland High School's Alumni Association honored her as an inductee into their Hall of Fame for her guidance, teaching methods and the way she inspired her students.

"She was one of my favorite teachers," Richard Cooksey posted to Facebook. "I would (have) never made it out of high school without her help."

Said Lee Weber, another of her students, "She was unabashedly herself. She was demanding and pushed us to be creative and excellent. Her lessons in editing and journalism have helped me my entire career."

In the words of former student Kristi Wilderman, "Boy, did we learn a lot from you, Ms. Criswell!"

At VFW Auxiliary National Headquarters, we can certainly say the same.

This is our great loss. But as 2023-2024 Department of Alabama President and frequent National Musician Patsy Cole said, "...heaven's gain."
