The art brochure and its accompanying forms contain important changes that are new this Program Year. It is important to refer to and use only the newest forms and brochures for our scholarships and contests. Look for updated resources for Auxiliary scholarships and contests as well as our new Fact Sheet on our National website, vfwauxiliary.org.

Specifically, find scholarship and contest entry forms, brochures and brochure order forms under the Scholarships & Contests tab on our home page or in MALTA Member Resources. The Young American Creative Patriotic Art brochure and Illustrating America info. sheet contain updates, among them, less restrictions on pieces that are matted. We wanted to make this contest more inclusive and we wanted to decrease the likelihood that we would have to eliminate entries at the National level.

That said, it is very important that students, parents, teachers and members/Chairmen at the local, District and Department level read and follow the contest rules. If an entry does not qualify because it isn't following the rules, you CAN send this back to the student to fix, but only BEFORE it gets sent to National Headquarters for judging.

Also note the change to the maximum dimensions of the two-dimensional entries, and that students must now add their name/grade to the back of Illustrating art entries.





MEMBERS APPLAUD AUXILIARY SISTER WHOSE DEDICATION TO VETERANS NEVER WAVERED, NOT EVEN IN THE FACE OF WORLDWIDE UNCERTAINTY

During a looming pandemic, when the world was becoming more locked down and more isolated, Nurse Navigator Tresa Manor's commitment to hospitalized veterans and her sense of service for America's heroes expanded. The Auxiliary 2908 Life Member honors veterans living in North Carolina State Veterans Home-Salisbury through her work as a care advocate. It is work that fulfills her passion of always providing a caring hand.

"I consider veterans the heroes of this great country.

I feel so rewarded in my work with them on a daily basis,"

Manor said.

After working for years in patient care, a new job as nurse navigator developed that Manor stepped into. In this role, she is the initial point of contact for veterans and their families as they transition from the hospital, nursing home or from their own home to the state's long-term care facility.

"I am empathetic to how hard those transitions can be; therefore, I try to always show compassion and love to these families during this time and especially our veterans for their sacrifice and their ongoing care needs with us," she added.

Manor was excited to step into the role, but never expected to encounter an unforeseen battle in this new position: a pandemic.

"It was my role during this time and moving forward to facilitate...any form of communication between veterans and their loved ones given the inability to coordinate visitation otherwise," she said. "Many of our veterans suffer with dementia and I felt called to ensure that they had every access we could provide to their loved ones, in any form we could make it happen."

Manor spent time on and off in the COVID isolation unit with the veterans placed there.

"They conveyed to me how much closure this provided and how much this meant to their families," Manor continued. "I couldn't imagine being in their shoes, but I knew that I could help in this way, and I wanted to help in any and every way I could.

One of our veterans from World War II who was on the beaches of Normandy told me that the time of COVID was 'horrible' and 'reminded me of the invasion on D-Day.' This was the level of fear, sorrow, and isolation he felt."

Manor wanted to make sure to let veterans know they aren't forgotten by their family and staff.

"This was such a heartbreaking time, to see isolation so close. I considered it a privilege to serve this gap," Manor said.

Manor coordinated with their facility chaplain to conduct memorial services for those veterans who passed while in the home.

"She felt terrible that these veterans had no one to come see them and, in the end, she wanted to remember them," said friend and Auxiliary sister Jenny Allen. "Tresa continues with her memorial services and now has a monthly memorial service for those veterans who passed away during the month. Her compassion for veterans is truly unwavering."

Said Allen, Manor always says that she doesn't have to look for her dream job because she has already found it. While COVID lockdown might be a thing of the past, Manor still goes to work every day with a mission to love, show compassion and to help communicate veteran and family needs.

"I truly feel called to this, and I LOVE my job," Manor said. "I get to go to work every day to love on and serve our

veterans to ensure they enjoy their quality of life in our building...what could be better? This is more than a job to me; it is my mission/ministry in this life." * SM

VFW AUXILIARY MUSEUM:





The VFW Auxiliary Museum at National Headquarters in Kansas City, Missouri was the brainchild of thenincoming National President Juanita Crowe-Durbino, who proposed it to the Council of Administration at National Convention in 1993. Crowe-Durbino said it was "very appropriate to begin such an endeavor in our landmark 80th year." She was right! Just shy of one year later, Crowe-Durbino was present for the grand opening, joined by four Past National Presidents: Marie Klugow (1964-1965), Marion Watson (1981-1982), Florence Taylor (1982-1983) and Fran Booth (1990-1991). That was 30 years ago.

Members from across the nation made donations to the new museum, including sending in pins, badges, Encampment anniversary plates and even discontinued uniforms to be displayed on mannequins. Other displayed items include a beautiful Snowball Express quilt, past awards, a panel dedicated to the National Home, a panel dedicated to VFW Auxiliary Junior Girls, official trinkets from Statue of Liberty trips, a photo collage of Better. World Award recipients, special gifts presented by National Presidents throughout the years and more. Additionally, a Wall of Presidents includes the official photos of each Past National President with their years of service (aside: did you know that five National Presidents served two terms and one served three?) along with framed photos of Past National Secretaries and Secretary-Treasurers.

Helen Harsh, Senior Vice-President under Crowe-Durbino, loved the addition of the official museum to Auxiliary Headquarters so much she made it her National President's Special Project for the 1994-1995 Program Year, which brought in even more wonderful items for the archives and funds to keep it running. Three decades later, the museum has grown so much it has nearly outgrown its space, but the hope is to renovate it one day.

Tours of the museum are available upon request. Those who visit the museum are both encouraged to sign the guest book and are welcome to take pictures. Unfortunately, we cannot accept unsolicited donations, but we are seeking the following: the Bicentennial Postcard Book, a modern uniform with hat and pins, the 25 Years of the Ladies Auxiliary to the VFW book, a wooden rack on which to display a quilt and any potentially rare items from the first 25 years of Auxiliary existence (1914-1939). National President BRENDA BRYANT

Growing up in the small, northeastern Missouri

community of Hawk Point, Brenda Bryant knew what heroes looked like. They weren't movie stars or sports icons. They didn't wear capes or jet packs. Heroes wore the uniforms of the U.S. military and served our country to keep

everyone safe. In her household of six siblings, heroes were veterans.

"My goal is to always do what I can for veterans," said the VFW Auxiliary's 2024-2025 National President.

"I was only about 6 years old when my neighbor's body was brought back from Vietnam. But the feeling of sadness within our small community is something I will never forget. I live in a community that is proud of our veterans no matter where they served."

Bryant, a 45-year-plus member of Humphrey-Schwerdt Auxiliary 2180 in Warrenton, joined on the eligibility of her U.S. Army veteran father as soon as she could, at age 16.

Both of her parents, Herman and Twila Stuck, instilled a strong foundation of patriotism and a passion for volunteering. Her father helped institute her hometown's first VFW and her mother later set about establishing an Auxiliary to the Post there.

"From the time I was a small child, my mother helped me understand what our veterans are giving up to keep us free and why we should always appreciate them. I was very young when the VFW started a Post in our community. I helped with the kitchen before we even had an Auxiliary. So when the Auxiliary started up, I wanted to be a part of the work they were doing."

She has served the organization in many capacities including Auxiliary, District and Department President. On the National level she has served as National District Council Member, Big Ten Conference Chairman for the Membership and Safety Programs twice, National Appeals & Grievances and Bylaws Review & Resolutions Committees, Director of the Voice of Democracy Program and as National Historian.

Bryant's story of serving and honoring veterans began in a place known as a small town with a big heart. Years later, veterans are still in her heart and drive her vision for the 2024-2025 Program Year. Her theme is From Our Roots to Our Branches, Extending Service to Our Veterans.

The roots are our veterans and Auxiliary members of the past — the people who helped shape us into who we are. The trunk of the tree represents our veterans because they are the strong individuals who hold us up and why we work so hard for this organization. The branches signify all the members in this organization, as well as all the branches of the military. Finally, the leaves are all the many Programs we do for our veterans, our families and our communities.

And as the tree branches reach up and out, by working together, we can also reach for the skies.

During her year as National President, Bryant's hope is that she can inspire others to advocate for veterans by working with legislators.

"Speak up and tell others outside of our organization about what we are doing and maybe they will join us." Her special project, Operation Bottom Cover, will help military and veteran families who are struggling with the rising cost of diapers for their children. 





HISTORY OF ELIGIBILITY

Before there was a VFW with a VFW Auxiliary, there were

Before there was a VFW with a VFW Auxiliary, there were women working hard to help veterans, war widows and their families. These women amped up their efforts when the Spanish-American war began in 1898, and in 1914, as World War I broke out across Europe, the VFW Auxiliary was officially formed.

Six years later, in 1920, after more than eight decades of suffrage, protests and demonstrations in the fight for equality, women in America finally won the right to vote. (This means Auxiliary members had been exercising their right to vote for the next National President for six years before they were able to vote in a United States Presidential election.) That same year, at National Encampment in Washington, D.C., members voted to expand Auxiliary membership eligibility. Up until that point, even though there were many women doing the work of caring for veterans in their families and communities, membership was restricted to the wives of VFW-eligible veterans. The expansion allowed for the inclusion of mothers, sisters and daughters of veterans of foreign service, as well as Army nurses who had served overseas and could join under their own eligibility; women veterans would not be allowed to join the VFW for another 58 years.

1920 was a big year for big decisions at a National level. In addition to the change in membership eligibility, members opted to disband the Board of Trustees and replace them with a National Council of Administration, which was composed of the National President, National Secretary, and five women elected to National Office. Dues were also increased to \$.25, to be paid in two installments (June and December). This was the year the Auxiliary Charter was officially adopted and signed, ending the Auxiliary's six-year trial period and the

year the Auxiliary Constitution and Bylaws were created and implemented. Floor work began at this encampment, though there was no Conductress* or Guard yet; these positions would be added in 1921 and 1924, respectively.

The VFW Auxiliary has seen many changes in the past 104 years since that National Encampment, and even more since its formation in 1914, 110 years ago, but we remain steadfast in our dedication to our veterans, soldiers, their families, the National Home, local youth and our communities through our 11 Programs, countless events, monetary donations, boots-on-the-ground hard work and thousands of hours spent volunteering every year. Currently, membership is restricted to spouses, parents, siblings, children, stepchildren, grandparents and grandchildren; Army nurses who have served in combat on foreign soil and other veterans who are VFW-eligible must join the VFW, not the Auxiliary, though those women who became dual members prior to the shift from Ladies Auxiliary to the VFW to VFW Auxiliary (which is co-ed) are able to remain dual members as long as membership in the Auxiliary does not lapse; this includes our 2023-2024 National President Carla Martinez, who joined the VFW after serving in the U.S. Navy and joined the Auxiliary under the eligibility of her father, Harry Creel. Additionally, VFW Auxiliary members are not permitted to expand membership by a vote at National Convention anymore, as the IRS has determined an Auxiliary to a veterans service organization (VSO) is permitted to maintain their 501(c)(19) non-profit status only if "...its members are veterans, spouses of veterans or related to a veteran within two degrees of consanguinity - i.e. grandparent, brother, sister, grandchild represent the most distant allowable relationship." (More about this is available on the IRS.gov website.)
