By now everyone is well into their project reports utilizing Buddy Poppy with another program and some have been inventive to say the least! But there is a second National Citation for educating the community on National Home which seems to be throwing a

loop in the mix.

Since January of 2025 is their 100th anniversary maybe I can help with some information to make it seem a little more relevant since the home is not in Arizona and our country and time evolves as to what we can offer.

The origins of today's VFW National Home can be traced to a 23-year-old woman named Amy Ross. In 1922, Ross made it her mission to help find jobs for the thousands of unemployed veterans in Detroit. VFW received a donation from millionaire cattleman Corey Spencer, who gifted 472 acres of land near Eaton Rapids, MI.

On Jan. 7, 1925, the VFW National Home was founded, helping to fulfill the VFW pledge to "honor the dead by helping the living." Later that spring, the Home welcomed its first family to an old frame farmhouse, Mrs. Pollett and her six children. Pollett had become suddenly widowed and lost her husband's military pension.

Another focus was on children and their health. At the time a hospital was needed with some of the health issues in children like polio. A hospital was built to focus on those needs as well as other needs of families. You can walk through the National Museum and the history and see pictures of the kids in the hospital and some of the other activities they were able to do like participating in the volunteer fire department.

The National Home has evolved to meet the changing needs of America's military and veterans' families. Through it all, one thing has remained constant: the National Home's commitment to honor our nation's veterans and active-duty military by providing help and hope for their children and families. The Home provides a "hand up, not out" through counselors, education, and structure.

Arizona sponsors the Arizona house which helps to provide a family with a home, no rent, and a chance to prepare for the future with guidance, educational support and counseling as well as jobs. Yes, it is not in Arizona, it is located in Eaton Rapids Michigan where there is the most bang for the buck. Looking at the cost of maintaining 42 homes, teachers, education centers and supportive services we can help and reach many over the United States. Remember, the Veteran that protected you came from many communities and many states.

Please consider making this an outstanding year in fundraising leading up to the 100th Anniversary Celebration and include poppies in all that you do. Home Front Hero, Tribute brick, Centennial Brick, Life Membership and Legacy.

Some Fun Ideas for February events and projects:

- Childrens Dental Health Month give a toothbrush and mouthwash with poppies attached.
- Mardi Gras include a metal poppy in the bread baby, attach to poppies to Mask and beads.
- Valentines Day hearts, candy, send a card-include a metal poppy, and don't forget National Shut-in day Feb 19th.
- World Scout Day do a Poppy drive utilizing your local scout troop, place flag and poppy at gravesite.
- Presidents Day Preamble scroll with Poppy to hold rolled up.



Be an Advocate – Be Informed – Be Engaged

In January the VFW sent out a new set of Priority goals for the 2024 year. They can be found in MALTA under resources and Legislature or on our website vfwauxaz.org. Be

sure to look it up and find out what we are doing for our veterans.

Remember, the National Citation is for our Auxiliaries to host an activity and/or event that educates their community on Veteran Legislation issues. Now is the time to have town halls or host a meet and greet with their legislators. Find out who or what they can and are doing for our Veterans. The Sandra Day O'Connor institute has a great write up at https://civicsforlife.org/citizens-guide-to-presidential-primaries-2024/ this will help you through the primaries and help us get informed. Now is the time to start. Remember to look into the Civics 101 course so you might be the winner at our Department Convention, May 29th - June 2nd at Loews Ventana Canyon in Tucson. Let me know if you have taken the course.

Have you to signed up for **VFW ACTION CORPS** weekly? Let me know how many you sign up. Are you receiving **Legislative Alerts**? If so, act on them.

Many bills have hidden Washington tricks that cause them to be harder to pass. The VFW realizes they needed to rally their members. To help us understand the process of a bill becoming a law information can be found at www.house.gov

Introduction & Referral of a Bill

• Any member in the House of Representatives may introduce a bill at any time while the House is in session by simply placing it in the "hopper" at the side of the Clerk's desk in the House Chamber. The sponsor's signature must appear on the bill. A public bill may have an unlimited number of co-sponsoring members. The bill is assigned its legislative number by the Clerk and referred to the appropriate committee by the Speaker, with the assistance of the Parliamentarian. The bill is then printed in its introduced form, which you can read in Bill Text.

 An important phase of the legislative process is the action taken by committees. It is during committee action that the most intense consideration is given to the proposed measures; this is also the time when the people are given the opportunity to be heard. Each piece of legislation is referred to the committee that has jurisdiction over the area affected by the measure. For more information on this step of the legislative process see <u>Introduction and Referral to Committee of How</u> <u>Our Laws Are Made.</u>

It was recently brought to the Departments attention that there is a Shark Claim Bill - SB 1308 that will be coming before the Arizona Legislation. To read the bill, click here.

Together we can make a difference in the lives of our veterans, service men and women, and their families. We must remember they have protected our freedoms. Now it is time for us to protect their rights and benefits.

- How did the mentoring structure happen in auxiliaries, districts and the department.


When communicating with your members, use language that will resonate with your membership. As we mentor each other, we can learn from each other, the Auxiliary leadership, programs and find our **WHY**.

Whenever you are leaving information, add an attention-grabbing item, such as bright colors in a flyer or perhaps something like her ducks. Just be sure that you provide both information on the scholarships as well as either contact info or links to websites for additional assistance.

If you were to title your Auxiliary's Veteran and Family Support Program with a love song title, what would that title be? February is the month to recognize our Veteran Patients (and

Caregivers). A little Thank You recognition goes a long way to someone in care.

Last year a Kindergarten Class in Kingman, colored printed pictures that depicted a popsicle dripping with the caption, "Veteran, you melt me" for Valentine's Day. These were shared with Veterans at VFWs and Care facilities-and met by one now current Commander with, "You melt me. You know I still have the very first note I received when I was serving". It matters to connect with those who may otherwise not hear words of support.

Honor Flight- we all celebrated Bob Braa's invitation to Honor Flight, and he received "more than anyone else" on the flight home "Mail Call". What about those Veterans who did not receive cards or notes of gratitude? It is simple to look up Honor Flight Arizona and connect with those coordinating the next

tours and offer a packet of cards and letters of encouragement and thanks for our Veterans' service. Leave them unsealed so they may be addressed for any Veteran.

Report Time: This is a call for every Auxiliary to explore the Veteran Service Organizations in your community. So many of the reports have shown things "I never knew existed". Find them. Connect with them. Partner with them. Reach out as the VFW Auxiliary to learn how to better serve our Veteran Community.

The only report that is required of an Auxiliary is Veteran and Family Support. You are doing the work in your community. If you are stumped, drop me an email or give me a call and we can discuss what you are doing and how that can be turned into likely more than one report. I love the emails that read, "The Auxiliary has raised money. Where would you suggest it could be donated?" (My head reels with "Wheel of Veteran Organizations")

Housekeeping: Wayback Machine: Remember Arizona Proposition 130- the % of Veteran disability off their property taxes that passed at the 2022 General Election? Filing for that exemption is again on the table and will close in each county by the end of February. Look to your County Assessor website under "Exemptions". Affidavit form from the County Assessor, letter from the VA showing % of Veteran disability status, property identification, photo identification are documents to file for the exemption. Please read the documents that list income that is considered. If you filed last year, the Assessor's Office should be sending a notice to inquire if anything has changed.

Land. I received a recent phone call requesting help. I went into the "Sky is falling" mode and made phone calls to representatives in the know. In so doing, let's talk about where our efforts can be directed. Arizona State Veterans Home Yuma should now be staffed and opened. Flagstaff had some construction issues which need to be corrected to completely open that facility. As Veteran and Family Support, that moves to the one funded by SB1172 in 2021 to break ground in Mohave County. First concern alleviated: They would be defunded by March 2024. Corrected, SB1172 the bill to allot funds, will not be defunded until June 2025. The clock is ticking. Next, at least 10 acres of commercial land needs to be "donated" to break ground. Not just any land. The land must support water, electricity, a service staff of individuals, local hospital, meet the needs of the residential Veteran population the home would serve. Land, in Mohave County, to best serve this facility. Any ideas?

At Winter Conference, Chuck Byers from Arizona Department of Veterans Services, spoke about the Tanner Thomas Village for Veterans Home - Tanner Community Development Corporation (tcdccorp.org) 600 and 400 sq ft individual "Casitas" for Veterans 3 blocks from the Phoenix VA facility located at 1803 E. Broadway. After fulfilling the City of Phoenix requirements, this Veterans Village looks forward to breaking ground the 2nd or 3rd week in February. Each Casita will be fully furnished with sleep area, kitchenette, washer/dryer and even a dog door. To Adopt a Casita-\$800.00 covers fully furnishing, an additional \$200.00 allows the Veteran to personalize their living space. At the time of this writing, there are still 10 Casitas available to adopt. TCDCCorp.org Under Programs, Donate. The contact information and Casita/Village plans are all available to view.

Register to vote. Our voice matters. Be cognizant of the initiatives that affect Veterans, Active-Duty Military (especially our Installations in Arizona), their families, (inclusive of Education initiatives for Military Family students) and our community. Contact your representatives. How we vote, how they vote, affects us in supporting our Veterans and Families.
