

Sisters and Brothers—

You are all so amazing. In the past five years as I have traveled around the country to your various states, I could never have imagined how many new friends I would make along the way. Let's keep this in mind every day and as we head into National Suicide Prevention Awareness Month.

This year, VFW National Commander-in-Chief Duane Sarmiento and I have a joint project together to put a convenience store inside the Welcome Center at the VFW National Home. Instead of residents and visitors needing to drive 60 minutes round trip for bread, cereal, milk or just a snack at the nearest store, they will have it right there on campus. This will save them gas, money and time.

Department Presidents and Commanders, I have had the privilege of getting to know most of you over the past few years and you are all rock stars. You hit the ground running and have not looked back. When asked to work together as a team, you have done so and continue to do so. In order to be successful, you cannot do the work alone. Excited is an understatement of how I feel about getting to work alongside of you all each and every day. I, along with everyone else in our organization, are members first, and the members are the ones who will take the greatest veterans' organization into the 22nd century.

service. She then decided to make bags comprised of earthly tributes as featured in the 2023 Podium Edition for the Veterans of Foreign Wars of the United States.

Polly Buchanan, another member of VFW Auxiliary 1518, said the tributes consist of a laurel wreath, a white flower, a blue flower, a small evergreen branch, a small American Flag, and a small black bag (made by the Auxiliary) with nine polished spent cartridges from the honorary gun salute.

"The small, handled paper bags are always red, white or blue," Buchanan added. "A ribbon of the same color is tied to one handle. A VFW decal is put on the front of the bag. A typed-up notecard is included in the bag that defines each tribute as recited during the ceremony and includes the Post Commander's name and contact information."

After the Post Commander gives a personalized eulogy for the deceased veterans, Post members recite the Ritual script and place one of the tributes on the casket or beside the cremated remains. The blue flower is placed by an Auxiliary representative.

At the close of the ceremony, a representative collects all the tribute elements and places them in a tribute bag before presenting them to the spouse or family. A rifle team member will also present a small black bag with spent shells.

Each item in the tribute bag has symbolism, but four of them are most focused on during funeral services and Memorial Day services.

According to the 2023 Podium Edition, the American Flag represents a bond and is an emblem of liberty. White flowers are placed as a token of the purity of affection others have for their departed comrades.

Blue flowers from nature's bosom symbolize a sincere respect for all departed comrades. The wreath is placed as a token for eternity.

"Its color bespeaks life everlasting," the Ritual states.
"Thus, do we say that the deeds of military service
members on land, on sea and in the air are immortalized
in the hearts of a grateful people."

"The tribute bag is a wonderful way to end our impressive memorial funeral service for our local veterans," Buchanan said.

Outside of the tribute bags, LeBourdais does more to support veterans in their families in Gaylord.

"Mary Kay got the idea for our Post to join this national program (Wreaths Across America) of putting a wreath on veterans' graves every December," Buchanan added.

LeBourdais also plans free lunches for veterans on Veterans Day, gets involved with local Eagle Scout projects, walks in almost every parade, arranges Poppy distributions, rings a bell for the Salvation Army and plans free movie nights for veterans and their families.

SPECIAL JOINT PROJECT UPDATE



Home campus, the Welcome Center is the first stop along the way to new beginnings. "We want residents, guests and visitors

to feel welcome when they arrive and while they're on our campus," said Mike Wilson, VFW National Home Executive Director.

Members' donations to a combined special project of VFW Auxiliary National President Carla Martinez and VFW Commander-in-Chief Duane Sarmiento this Program Year will help transform the space.

"By converting the current administration lobby into the Welcome Center, we will be able to bring more support to the families on campus," Wilson said. "Because we are miles from town, there is little support when it comes to basic food and beverage needs. The retail space in the welcome center will be a space where residents can get simple things like bread, milk and microwavable dinner choices that are conducive to feeding a family on a limited budget and time constraint. In the meantime, our clothing and souvenir space in the Welcome Center will be more convenient for our visitors and guests, and more accessible for all visitors."

For nearly 100 years, the National Home has helped military and veteran families who need a fresh start. Families can live there rent-free for up to four years and

have access to professional case management services, on-site licensed child care, life skills training, tutoring and other educational services as well as recreational and community service opportunities. Families find healing in a safe and peaceful environment of tree-lined streets, 42 single-family homes, facilities such as a gym, library, computer and science labs, day care center, playgrounds, fishing pond, hiking trails and more.

"We are thankful for the VFW Auxiliary and Carla for supporting us throughout the years," Wilson said. "This new Welcome Center will be a game changer in how we support the families within our community. This project is part of our mission to provide a positive, safe and healthy environment for our residents to achieve their personal and family goals."

NATIONAL PRESIDENT

CARLA MARTINEZ



U.S. Navy
veteran
Carla Martinez
brings an
unprecedented facet
to new her role as VFW
Auxiliary National President.

She is the organization's very first dual member to hold this position as of July 27 when members elected her at its 110th National Convention in Phoenix, Arizona.

Martinez, who was born in South Carolina and moved with her family where her father's U.S. Air Force career led them, calls Utah home. A VFW Gold Legacy Life Member, she served in the military for 13 months in Korea as a cryptologist, and is surrounded by a family of veterans and service members; her father-in-law, huband/"submarine hero" Stan and son have all served their country.

Growing up, she said, her father, Harry Creel, was her hero and she credits him with inspiring her Auxiliary journey.

"I wanted to make him proud of me," she said. "I loved seeing the comradery between everyone and even though the children had extracurricular activities, we still managed to go to the Post home and do family events with the VFW and Auxiliary."

She fondly recalls joining Post and Auxiliary members in parades, on long weekends and at the lake for family fishing trips filled with fun, music and togetherness. "We would fish, swim, play games and dance to music; we would all play together and meet new kids instead of sitting at home watching television. We helped with breakfast on Sundays. This was very much a second family to everyone."

Martinez, a Life Member of Lt. Clarence E. Allen Auxiliary 409 in Salt Lake City, joined the Auxiliary in 1982.

"At that time, I was like others working but my job was in the military and I had to travel a lot around the world. I started a family which made my life even busier. Like a lot of young people, I used to say I don't have the time, but as the years went by, I realized what was important is family and the VFW and Auxiliary are family."

Another chapter in Martinez' professional life was helping those with catastrophic work-related injuries; she retired from WFC Insurance after more than two decades with them.

As VFW Auxiliary National President, Martinez hopes to bring more attention to suicide prevention awareness and the latest Veterans Crisis Line three-digit number 988 (then press 1) as she traverses the nation. This new number, launched in the summer of 2022, is easier to remember and share and easier for those in need to access. While she requests no monetary support of suicide prevention, one of her projects, she does ask that members support awareness via the Auxiliary's Veterans & Family Support National Program.



"The thing I am looking forward to the most is bringing more attention to suicide awareness and the new 988 number that individuals can use instead of having to remember a long number and then wait on hold to get help. Because I get the opportunity to go to each state, I can personally thank everyone for everything they do. I want to encourage, along with our VFW Commander-in-Chief Duane Sarmiento, teamwork between the VFW and Auxiliary, as we are a team."

That sense of VFW and Auxiliary teamwork lends itself to her theme of *Banding Together for Our Veterans*.

"If we virtually link our arms together across the world we can be united for our veterans," she said.

Beyond suicide prevention awareness, Martinez and Sarmiento have a joint special project to raise funds for a VFW National Home Welcome Center renovation project that will include an on-campus (rather than a store that takes 30 minutes each way to reach) retail space that will save residents time and money when it comes to purchasing essentials like bread and milk. Read more about this on page 9.

Additionally, Martinez said, "I truly feel the Auxiliary is the backbone of the VFW. We get to work some wonderful Programs that help our veterans and their families. We go out in our communities and work with the VFW to help the homeless. We help to beautify our

neighborhoods and cities. I get to go to the VA hospital and work bingo... and in the dental clinic to get the patients the care they need."

On a personal note, Martinez is the first in her family to attend college and she has a master's degree in criminal law. She and Stan are proud grandparents; her son and daughter-in-law have four children ages 5-15. When not tasked with the responsibilities of taking the helm as the Auxiliary's top National Officer, you'll find her doing some of the things she loves, like volunteering at her area VA hospital, recruiting and mentoring members or bowling or swimming. • AC

HISTORY

PROTECTING VETERANS' BENEFITS FOR MORE THAN 80 YEARS

In the early-to-mid 1940s, coverage of the war dominated the airwaves and newspapers not only across the country, but across the world, including in the pages of the *VFW Auxiliary Bulletin*.

This publication was a precursor to VFW Auxiliary Magazine, a periodical with few photos or ads and an abundance of information for members of what was then the Ladies Auxiliary to the VFW. It included prewritten

speeches to be given at public events, updates about Programs and ideas for how to honor veterans on holidays, what sort of care packages to send those fighting overseas and suggestions of ways to help the families of currently serving soldiers.

One of these was to get involved in Legislation.

"Women Must Aid Fight to Protect Veteran Benefits," reads one headline in the November, 1942 issue. "One of the most important bills concerning veterans' welfare is... the War Widows' and Orphans' Pensions Bill." The bill, which was sponsored by the Veterans of Foreign Wars, had recently been passed by the House of Representatives and was headed to the Senate Finance Committee; its success was crucial to the well-being of Gold Star

families, some of whom had lost their spouses or parents recently, and others who had been struggling since World War I, which ended only 14 years prior. "Letters to your Senators and Representatives will hasten action upon this bill. Unless it is acted upon before the close of this session, the bill will expire, and this will necessitate introduction of further legislation with subsequent loss of time." For those widows and children suffering financial damage in addition to grieving their loved one, there was no time to lose.

Additionally, the article urged Auxiliary members to fight for the rights of members of the Women's Army Auxiliary Corps, as members were able to be deployed to war zones at risk of their lives, but were not eligible to purchase the National Service Life Insurance available to Army soldiers, and were turned down for private life insurance policies because of their likely future deployment. This was in reference to a bill sponsored by Congresswoman Edith Norse Rogers, who was instrumental in the creation of the Women's Army Corps. The intention was to ensure equality, care and consideration for these brave women

and their families.

"Write to your Congressmen," the unnamed writer of the article urged.

Eighty years later, the VFW, with considerable support from the VFW Auxiliary, was instrumental in the passing of the PACT Act, drafted to protect and aide veterans and families affected by toxins during training and service, including, but not limited to, those who suffered from cancers, respiratory illnesses, birth defects and even death as a result of burn pits in Iraq, poisoned water at Camp Lejeune and more.

Legislative involvement is just as important for VFW Auxiliary members in 2023 as it was in 1942, as we help ensure that our service members, veterans and their families get the help and

benefits they deserve. We amplify and uplift their voices, and make sure they are heard by our representatives both local and on a national level, as we "honor the dead by helping the living." *\rightarrow* NP
