One family's journey is changed forever for the better, thanks to you.

Life seemed about as hard as it could get for Brad and Sherry.

The year was 2013. Brad had recently left active military duty, returning home with plenty of post-traumatic stress. The couple were broke, without a home to call their own, ready to split up, and expecting a baby.

Brad's father told the couple about the VFW National Home for Children in nearby Eaton Rapids, MI. Here, generous donors are helping reunite and strengthen families in extraordinary ways.

His dad's description of such long-term, comprehensive assistance seemed too good to be true to Brad. But moving into the National Home, the couple found it was indeed true. Life began to get easier.

Benefiting by full-time childcare, Brad and Sherry both pursued better paying jobs and enrolled in college. The National Home's Early Education Center nurtures little ones' growth with love and care, imparting learning and encouraging each developmental milestone.

There was more. "Brad and I were having marital struggles, and the National Home paid for counseling — it was a huge relief," Sherry recalls of the successful therapy sessions.



Today, Sherry and Brad stay "busy as bees" raising Max, 8 and Daphne, 5. With her business degree, Sherry serves as a claims specialist for the State of Washington's family leave program. Having finished a second master's degree, Brad works as a mental health counselor in a private practice. The couple own their own home.

The beauty and serenity of the National Home's campus also eased Brad's PTSD symptoms. "It always felt safe there, peace inducing," Brad says. "Being in the outdoors was a godsend."

No matter the need, the VFW National Home for Children was there with solutions. Life began to look up. Hope restored, and the couple welcomed their second child. Brad and Sherry earned their degrees, moved on to professional jobs, and are raising their family in their own home.

With gratitude to everyone who contributes to the VFW National Home for Children, Sherry says, "I don't think we'd still be married or have our daughter if it weren't for this place. We will spend the rest of our lives giving back. It changed our life trajectory."

"It's an honor for me to be selected for this opportunity," Wilson says. "I have worked with the VFW National Home on many occasions and know this place is magical. It has helped so many families over its 97 years, and I am proud to be able to bring my talents to the team."

Debbie Bodimer-Wilson's brother was a Vietnam veteran.

"As costs rise, the National Home will, of course, need more funding to maintain these wonderful facilities and services. A great many people do not know about this incredible asset that continues to put veterans, their spouses, and children on a path for success."

Debbie decided she wanted her personal legacy to include a contribution to ensure the National Home would be available for future generations of our nation's war heroes and their families. "I took time to review financial reports to see where the funds go and how they are utilized. That gave me confidence that my legacy gift would truly benefit Veteran families and maintain the campus facilities."
